ADMISSIONS AND GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS FOR LANE COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS TRANSFERRING TO THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

The following information is for students transferring from Lane Community College to the University of Oregon without earning the Associate of Arts Oregon Transfer Degree (AAOT). Students planning to earn the AAOT should consult with a Lane academic advisor or counselor for information on AAOT-specific requirements.

#### ADMISSIONS REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS ENTERING THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

Prior to being admitted to the University of Oregon:

- □ English Composition: Any one of the following WR 121, 122 or 123 or the equivalent with a grade of C-or Pass or better.
- ☐ Mathematics 105 or 111 or higher, or the equivalent with a grade C- or Pass or better.
- Must have completed 36 <u>transferable</u> credits of college-level work (24 of which must be graded.) Students with less than 36 hours must submit their final high school transcript that includes their graduation date, and SAT or ACT test scores.
- ☐ Minimum GPA 2.25 (2.50 for nonresidents).
- All students who earned their GED or graduated from high school spring 1997 and thereafter must complete two years of the same second-language with a grade of C- or Pass or better. If not completed in high school, students need to take two (2) quarters or semesters of the same college-level foreign language with a grade of C- or better. Students fulfilling the second language requirements at Lane should complete French 102, Spanish 102 or American Indian Languages 102. For more information, students should consult a Lane academic advisor / counselor or the UO Admissions office.

## **GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS**

If the degree goal is a <u>Bachelor of Arts</u>, <u>Fine Arts</u>, <u>or Science</u>, the following distribution information applies: Fifteen (15) credits are required in each group, including at least two (2) courses from one (1) subject area and at least one (1) approved course from a second subject area. Students are limited to three (3) courses from any single academic department to satisfy group requirements. Courses must be a minimum of three (3) credit hours

If the degree goal is a <u>Bachelor of Architecture</u>, <u>Education</u>, <u>Interior Architecture</u>, <u>Landscape Architecture or</u> <u>Music</u>, the following distribution information applies:

Twelve (12) credits are required in each group. Two (2) groups must include at least two (2) courses in one subject. Each group must include courses in at least two (2) subjects. Students are limited to three (3) courses from any single academic department. Courses must be a minimum of three (3) credit hours.

#### **GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS**

- All students are required to complete work in each of three groups representing comprehensive fields of knowledge:
  - 1) Arts and Letters; 2) Social Science; and 3) Science.
- Courses used to fulfill the language requirement for the Bachelor of Arts degree may not also be used to fulfill the Arts and Letters group requirement.
- Courses used to demonstrate proficiency in mathematics, or in computer and information science, or in a combination of the two for the Bachelor of Science degree requirement may not also be used to fulfill the Science group requirement.
- Students may not count more than one (1) course as a general education requirement that has the subject code of their major. EXAMPLE: Biology majors can only count one BI- course in the Science group.

In addition to the General Education group requirements described above, the following graduation requirements must be completed:

• English Composition: Two courses – WR 121, and WR 122 (or 123) with a grade of C-, Pass or higher

Multicultural Requirement: <u>Two courses</u> – Specific guidelines and list of approved courses are listed on page 7.

#### **NOTES**

- Students may apply a maximum of 124 transfer credits toward their bachelor's degree. The University of
  Oregon will accept as part of the 124 credits, up to 12 credits of professional technical (PROT/VOCT) course
  work. They will also accept for transfer an additional 12 credits of Supervised Field Experience (SFE). Both
  professional technical (PROT/VOCT) and field experience (SFE) will be accepted as elective courses and do
  not satisfy group requirements unless specifically noted in the group listings (e.g. HO 150). The University of
  Oregon requires students to earn 62 upper division credits to graduate.
- A maximum of 24 credits may be earned in the following areas (a, b and c) with not more than 12 credits in
  any one area: a) Lower division professional technical (PROT/VOCT) courses; b) physical education and
  dance activity courses, except for dance activity courses for majors in dance and c) studio instruction in
  music, except for majors in music.
- Alphanumerical course numbers 100 and higher are transferable (e.g., Math 105). Exceptions to this rule
  are: a) the limits on professional technical, dance & PE and supervised field experience and b) courses
  considered to be remedial (ENG 115 and 117) which will not transfer to the University of Oregon. Course
  work considered to be remedial with numbers below 100 (e.g., Math 095) will not be accepted.
- Grades of F, NP, NC, U, Y may not be used to fulfill General Education requirements.
